On **July 17, 1998**, the nations of the world agreed on terms of the Rome Treaty of the International Criminal Court (ICC), the first and only permanent international criminal tribunal established to hold individuals accountable for genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes, including use of child soldiers, and widespread rape and mutilation used as weapons of war.

### ANTÔNIA PEREIRA DE SOUSA

is an Associate Cooperation Officer with the Jurisdiction, Complementarity and Cooperation Division (JCCD) of the Office of the Prosecutor of the ICC, responsible for cooperation and external communication, and the focal point within the OTP for developing an international student network.

Prior to working in the ICC, Antônia worked for the *Centre de Recherche en droit public* (CRDP) of the Law Faculty of the Université de Montréal, Canada, where she did legal research in the areas of international law, globalization and issues of governance and global security. Antônia also worked for a local NGO in Cape Town, South Africa, where she was responsible for providing legal advice to refugees and asylum seekers, as well as for organizing workshops and a weekly radio program on refugee and asylum seekers' issues.

### DAVID KAYE

is Executive Director of the UCLA School of Law International Human Rights Program. He served as an international lawyer with the U.S. State Dep't, responsible for issues as varied as human rights, international humanitarian law, the use of force, international organizations, international litigation and claims, nuclear nonproliferation, sanctions law and policy, and U.S. foreign relations law. He was a legal adviser to the American Embassy in The Hague, where he worked with international criminal tribunals and was counsel to the U.S. in several cases before the ICJ and Iran-U.S. Claims Tribunal.

He has written numerous book chapters in the area of human rights, and has published essays and op-eds in such publications as *The NY Times*, *The LA Times*, *International Herald Tribune*, *Foreign Policy*, *Middle East Insight* and *The San Francisco Chronicle*.

### EDWIN SMITH

is an expert on international law, international relations theory and foreign relations law, with joint appointments as a professor of law and of international relations at the University of Southern California, where he teaches Public International Law, International Organizations, Contracts, and seminars on Foreign Relations Law, the Law of War and the United Nations.

A magna cum laude graduate of Harvard University, Professor Smith received his J.D. from Harvard Law School. He also served as special counsel for foreign policy to United States Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan. He was appointed by President Clinton as an advisor to the United States Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and has lectured internationally on United Nations-NATO cooperation in peacekeeping.
